We have continued our theme of gratitude, empathy and mindfulness this term our gratitude tree (pictured) has grown as each child has. I have enjoyed watching as the class starts to reflect on the importance of how each of the individuals at the college have on their lives and the acceptance, that we are all on our own journeys and yet here to support each other.

This term saw the Year 9-10 class work side by side with our VET students. They were able to collaborate on group projects but also provided a unique insight for our students moving into Senior Secondary and the expectations of work for the onsite VET courses and the TAFE VETDSS program. I look forward to seeing how these two groups continue to develop and grow in Term 4.







Our lessons this term focused largely on our Science and HaSS curriculum. With students going through the engineering processes and designing, creating and changing model homes to withstand the effects of earthquakes. As each child's understanding grew the model homes were adapted to accommodate their new understanding of what is needed. To the left are images of the homes before being placed on the Earth's crust, and then during and after an Earthquake.

The scientific method became a focal learning point, understanding why we do an experiment and how we can apply this understanding to the real world. Our experiment on gummy bears led to discussions about mutations of the human body and explaining why our fingers wrinkle when saturated in water. Students also started exploring and developing existing experiments to create their own, increasing their understanding of scientific concepts.

As an educator, when students start leading their own educational paths this is the greatest reward. I am very proud of the student engagement this term, you guys are amazing.






Earthquake Research

Wear it purple day is NOT "PRIDE". It's not a day created to sexualise young people, and it's not necessary to politicise the event. It started because some distressed adolescents learned that their peers who were questioning their identity felt so troubled that they chose suicide.

Despite the changes we've seen in our world, there is abundant evidence that LGBTQ+ people are abused. The young who may begin to wonder if they are not like the majority of their peers, feel overwhelmed and often unsupported. In Australia suicide is 5 times greater amongst LGBTQ+ teens than their peers.

If we Wear Purple the last Friday in August each year – to work, on public transport, in shops and at every public place we go, we are showing young people that we are not the ones they need to hide from. We will not hurt them. We are allies. We might not identify as LGBTQ+ but we are trying to understand, and we believe they are deserving of our support.

Imagine the distress you experience about who you are, who you are attracted to, and whether you will be accepted. Then imagine seeing your dad's mate walk past you into the shop wearing a purple shirt, maybe a WIP wristband. Imagine how it would feel to realise without ever having had a conversation about all those things on your mind that this adult cares about the wellbeing of people like you. You might even feel you now have someone you can talk to, ask questions of, and be accepted.

That's why I, and my partner, and my therapy dogs *WEAR PURPLE* on the last Friday in August EVERY year. If you didn't join-in this year, mark your calendar for next!
